Gospel Reading set for today: John 20 v 19 – 31

Message from a Circuit friend

Our Gospel begins as an evening text for Easter Sunday. The disciples were taking refuge behind closed doors which they barred against the world outside. Presumably this nameless house would have been somebody's home and a safe place. It is within this setting that the risen Lord Jesus manifests himself to his band of close followers. Three days previously he had told them, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me", thus he utters the everyday greeting, 'Shalom' – 'Peace be to you' –'May you be saved from trouble' – 'May God give you every good thing.' Jesus shows them the visible marks of his Passion before sending them out, freshly inspired with God's Spirit; empowered to act *in loco parentis* with authority to forgive or to retain "the sins of any ..." and, presumably, the necessary discernment to judge between ... for had he not previously declared that the Father and he were "one" and elsewhere demonstrated that he had "authority on earth to forgive sins."





But Thomas was not present. He didn't directly witness the revelation nor, apparently, receive the gift of the Spirit. Consequently he refused to believe: 'Unless I see – unless I touch – I will not believe'! Seven days later, and in God's perfect timing, the risen Lord appears once again with the sole purpose of satisfying that human craving for visible and tangible proof of mysteries beyond our understanding. The greatest compliment which the Gospels pay to those beyond their day is found in Jesus' response to Thomas, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to belief." So this anonymous location, this nameless house, becomes the place where God's Rule and God's Reign are seen and Eternity is encountered in the person of the Risen Lord whose enduring influence we celebrate this Eastertide.
