Reflection

Our reflection for this Sunday is brought to us by Dee Moden our Local Preachers' Secretary

We read in Psalm 30, which is attributed to David, that cries for help were heard and they were lifted up out of despair. So, this Psalm is one of thanksgiving and praise for God's deliverance.

Then we have the Gospel reading from John how Jesus appeared to the disciples beside the lake, and how he took Peter aside and specifically asked him the question "Do you love me?" These disciples had been fishing all night to no avail and just as they were returning tired and disappointed, this man, who they didn't at first recognise, told them to cast their nets the other side. Why? what did he know? But despite all of this they did, and the result was an amazing catch which they struggled to haul into the boat, but then they realised it was the Lord, and suddenly it all made sense. Peter as impetuous as ever couldn't wait until the boat got to the shore, he had to get there first.

When they had finished breakfast Jesus took Peter aside to speak to him, this was a very important question Jesus was asking Peter. Even though it frustrated Peter to be asked 3 times, Jesus needed Peter to be sure and to understand what it meant, and the enormity of what Jesus was asking: "Do you love me? Then feed my sheep" This task was going to be greater than this massive haul. They were going out into the world to spread the Good News, they were to become "Fishers of Men"

We also have the reading from Acts where we hear of Saul's conversion. Such an amazing turnaround from persecution to utter devotion, from being notoriously famous for slaying Christians to becoming increasingly famous for being a Christian. He too was called, very spectacularly and most unexpectedly, to go out into the world to spread the Good News. Again, a personal invitation, a calling.



We are called in many different ways by God to do many different things enabling to spread the Good News. Some a gentle prodding, some a persistent nudging and some a dramatic change, and this can come at any point in our lives.

These two important readings from the N.T. are really stand-alone passages, because there is so much content to gain an insight into and unpick. The challenge for us all is to read these passages for ourselves, to explore personally what it means to us, also knowing too, that it won't be plain sailing!

We need to ask ourselves:

- Are we really listening, and recognising, God's call?
- Are we ready to take up that challenge?
- Are we willing to share the Good News?
