# Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

September 2025 feels to be a season for change, the same thought keeps recurring in my life, that we are closing one chapter and opening a new one. Since I wrote to you last we have held final acts of worship at Great Ellingham and Sporle chapels. Both experiences have been moving, as a chapter in the life of these two societies comes to an end. But that doesn't mean "the end" it means that a new chapter is beginning and we are starting to think about the next chapter in our work of mission in these two places, which won't be the same as before, but God is moving on and we wait to see what "Church" might look like in these places.

We have also seen a change in ministerial staff as Rev Anne has left the circuit after eleven years of working among us and having pastoral charge of over half of the circuit's churches during the last five years. Anne has contributed a huge amount to the life of the circuit and will be missed by many and we wish her and Merlin best wishes as they settle into their new life in Guernsey. But at the same time, we welcome Rev Neil, Lynn and Alex as they come and live among us. Neil's ministry will be different to Anne's and there will be a period of readjustment and settling in on both sides and the Circuit Leadership Team will give as much support as possible to help with this process.

I also recognise a year after starting to work among you that we have some small churches that are naturally small, but we also have some churches that are struggling with low numbers, lack of personnel and dwindling finances. Historically the Methodist Church has been guilty of shutting churches and closing the door on vital communities. I would like to engage in conversation with vulnerable churches to try to understand how we can re-shape for the future to continue to serve the mission of God in these places.

September 2025 is a time when we turn a new page and start to look at the future of the Methodist Church in this part of the country and rather than focussing on failure, I long to rejoice in the continuing work of Kingdom building.

### Nature in Norfolk

What would Britain be without our varied weather?

I'm writing this as East Anglia is about to have its third heatwave of the year, certainly the hot dry spells and then heavy rain is affecting our plants and insect life. Despite that my apple tree is laden with fruit as is my cultivated blackberry, both of these will have long roots that find moisture deep in the soil as the surface dries out.

A wet spring last year meant a reduced population of wasps last year and again this year. Good news if we're eating outside but as wasps eat aphids this may explain the numbers of aphids in our gardens and the countryside. Many Buddleias are looking very sick, but are expected to recover without treatment, due to being infested with the Melon-cotton aphid, typical signs are the curling and yellowed leaves. My living willow arch was crawling with Black willow aphids which left the leaves covered in sticky sap. Not wanting to use pesticides as I hang bird feeders from the willow I took the drastic action of cutting most of the arch to the ground then binning the aphids along with the prunings. I've left two strong uprights for the feeders and can now see and squash by hand any returning aphids.

Cycling in Broadland in early July I saw a very large moth resting on the outside of the 'Ladies' in Ranworth. Thanks to the wonders of the internet I could identify it as a Poplar Hawkmoth, just one of many different hawkmoths named after their food of choice. On that same three day cycle tour I saw several fields of pale blue Chicory grown as a 'cover crop'. Chicory is also called Blue Sailors and Coffee Weed, the latter as coffee substitute is made from the roots.





In North Norfolk I've also seen darker blue fields of Vipers Bugloss and the pale mauve Phacelia, the latter has a curled flower head giving it alternative names of Scorpion Weed and Fiddleneck. It's interesting to see how more farmers are using cover crops to prevent soil erosion and to add nutrients and structure to the soil.

Here in Holt I was pleased to see Bee Orchids had returned to an area of verge on Woodfields Rd in June. I've also enjoyed the colourful mixed wild flowers growing in the housing estate on Kerridge Way. The latter will have been seeded by someone, perhaps the housing association, but the orchids arrived by themselves and will keep returning if allowed to seed every year.

### Welcome to the Vels family!



Coming from a non-church going home it may seem strange that some of my earliest and most powerful memories relate to the experience of God.

From reading Bible stories in a children's Bible, to a little girl who led me to Christ (I'm not sure either of us knew what we were doing!) to beginning to read the Bible for myself, and then making a commitment to Jesus, I can testify to the many ways I met God as a boy despite lack of interest from my parents and younger brother.

Lynn's experience was a little different. She grew up as the second child (she has an elder brother) of parents who were deeply committed to the church both prior to marriage and as a family. Her mother remains a Society Steward today.

While I'm sure that there will be many opportunities to share more of our stories in the future, for now I want to confirm that I deeply believe in God's calling not only on my, but on all our lives, and indeed, on God calling us to England and specifically to the Central Norfolk Circuit. A little bit about our family: Lynn and I started dating a little over ten years ago in January of 2015. We got engaged in August, married in December, and immediately thereafter moved about 900 miles from our homes near to Johannesburg to the beautiful city of Cape Town on South Africa's west coast.

Three years later Lynn gave birth to a beautiful baby boy, Alexander Riley, whom we discovered soon after birth and an emergency operation, has the genetic disease cystic fibrosis. This illness is life limiting and affects the thickness of mucus in the body, causing, amongst others, difficulties with digestion and breathing.

We are grateful for many who have prayed for us in South Africa and the wonderful doctors and medical care we have had access to which has enabled us to keep Alex far healthier than expected. In spite of his illness he is a thriving six year old; we continue to keep him in prayer for as yet there is no cure, and we don't know what the future holds in terms of his health.

Lynn works as a vet and hopes to find employment soon after our arrival in the UK. As animal lovers our dogs are important to us, and they will be joining us in the manse. Both dogs are rescues - we have a greyhound, Indigo Jack, usually known as Indi, and a little black labrador cross called Blackie Swart. Swart is the Afrikaans word for black; a common South African nickname for someone with the surname Swart is Blackie, hence Blackie Swart.

Prior to responding to the call to full time ministry I studied film and video production and worked as a journalist / photographer for a local newspaper. I have enjoyed using some of those skills in ministry and hope to find opportunity to continue to do so in Norfolk. I do a little running to keep fit, a little pottering in the garden and DIY around the house. I don't often have time, but I am an avid reader.

In terms of ministry, I enjoy engaging people in how we understand the Bible, what it says to us today and how we continue to encounter Christ, not just in the church, but in the world around us. My hope for the next few months is that I will get to meet as many of you as possible as I believe that a healthy preaching ministry flows from good pastoral relationships. I've always been convinced that God calls all people into ministry and I look forward to journeying with you as we continue in ministry together. Lynn, Alex and I are excited to be moving to Norfolk, getting to know you and working alongside you in the Circuit and to meet you in person. Until then, God's richest blessings!

### East Anglia Methodist Heritage Centre at Wighton



Have you visited our very own Methodist Heritage Centre at Wighton, in the former Primitive Methodist Chapel (NR23 1PG)?

Thanks to the generosity of the Central Norfolk Circuit, it has been possible to create this fascinating collection, telling the story of the Methodist people in East Anglia through exciting displays and archival material.

We have a wealth of photos, orders of service, books, ceramics, hymnbooks, collecting boxes and unique artefacts which evoke all sorts of conversations and memories.

The Heritage Centre reopened for visitors at Easter this year with a new exhibition about the life and work of Norfolk Methodist architect Clifford Dann and the many Methodist Churches he designed, including the school room and toilets at Wighton in about 1960. This is our third season at Wighton and each year we have a new exhibition to encourage visitors to return again and again.

Our builders completed the internal alterations for an accessible toilet and walk-in store before we reopened at Easter and the roof is on the extension that will double the size of our library. We have raised nearly £54,000 in grants and donations and have interest free loans for the remaining £8,000 we expect to need to pay for all of this.

We plan to hold a service of celebration when all the work is complete and we have the books catalogued and back on the shelves and the box files filled with the papers from churches, circuits and district and accessible for researchers and visitors to use.

If any of you would like to bring a car full to visit the Heritage Centre you would be very welcome. There is a lot that is new to see. If you would like to bring a group we would be happy to provide a speaker and guided tour on any day of the week. Please book in advance.

The Heritage Centre is open Tuesdays and Fridays from 11 am to 3 pm until the end of September and you are assured of a warm welcome from our team of volunteers. Car parking, an accessible toilet and refreshments are available. It is free to visit but donations are always welcome.

On **Saturday 13 September**, to link with Heritage Open Days and the Norfolk Churches Trust Bike Ride, Walk and Drive event, we will have a special open day from **11 am to 3 pm**. At 2 pm we will be holding a 30 minute 'Hymn Singalong'. Choose your favourite hymn which will be played on the recently refurbished 120 year old American Reed organ for all to join in.

We know Lord that you are a God of justice.


May your Spirit guide us then, to have a voice to call for, and the strength to take action for a country without the need for food banks.


### Holt

Another busy three months at the chapel The Pilgrims Cross groups came as planned at Easter and even more people than in previous years. What a joy to welcome them and share in their pilgrimage. On Saturday morning a group led service with the chapel quite full. Some pilgrims showed tiredness and stragglers arrived all through the service.

Easter Sunday 12noon with the sun out and everything quiet in Walsingham. A few people unable to process around the village arrived and we waited and waited. It appeared that their mass at the shrine had taken longer than expected but eventually people with hi-vis jackets approached from the road opposite.





The procession emerged with beautifully decorated crosses and it kept coming, crossing the road and up the slope to the chapel. More crosses appeared and more people until the area outside the chapel doors was packed and a shout went out "Could you start going into the church."

We believe God has a purpose for the Methodist Church in Little Walsingham and we have continued working with the Anglican Shrine in welcoming a huge number of school groups of all denominations and none. An academy from King's Lynn where the youngsters asked about the chapel and what we did and a young man standing in the tall pulpit had the confidence to speak to an audience.

A public school made a self-guided visit and from the older youngsters pertinent searching questions on faith. With their 2 ordained school chaplains also present.

Just this week a small group from a voluntary Catholic primary school came on a residential visit, absolutely brimming with great questions but also having fun and taking time to enjoy the chapel. One question "Are Methodists Christian?" As I went to say yes the Catholic teacher jumped in with yes of course, and whilst they do things slightly differently to us we all believe in God. We were able to explain in more detail. It was wonderful to have a Catholic school emphasising togetherness. Youngsters certainly do set us thinking; **Why can't adults ask questions and learn to work together?** 

This week certainly showed us that God is at work and we need to be ready to share our faith in unexpected ways. As we were shutting up on Friday 11th July a lady wandered in and asked if she could look at the building. She had come to Walsingham for one night the previous weekend and felt such joy and peace that when she got back home to London asked her employer for some time off as she felt compelled to return to Walsingham and returned on Friday and returned to stay longer. She started to ask questions about what we believed, and then about Walsingham itself and all that went on. She was delightful, exploring her faith asking lots of questions and listening. We believe that God was speaking to her and we hope she will join us at our monthly service whilst she is here. Most of all we hope she is able to welcome Jesus into her heart.
